ITEM 1. Proposed Project

The Victor Valley Station Off-Highway Vehicle Enforcement Team is responsible for law enforcement services in several legal off-highway vehicle riding areas in the High Desert of Southern California. Over 100,000 acres of legal off highway vehicle riding areas fall under the jurisdiction of the Victor Valley Off-Highway Enforcement Team. Some of these areas include El Mirage OHV area, Johnson Valley OHV area, Stoddard Wells OHV area, Juniper Flats OHV area, as well as a network of riding trails in the San Bernardino National Forest area. Due to the closure of legal riding areas in nearby counties and the compression of the Johnson Valley off- highway vehicle area, closures of recent burn areas, the Victor Valley area continues to show a substantial increase in recreational OHV use.

The Victor Valley Sheriff's station received over 306 off-highway vehicle-related law enforcement calls for service over the past year. This number does not include the over 319 self-initiated off-highway vehicle patrols and hundreds of public contacts. During these contacts, OHV participants were either educated on the legality of their chosen riding areas or cited for violating California laws. Our goal is to increase the presence of the Off-Highway Vehicle Enforcement Team giving us the opportunity to educate the ever growing OHV community.

The Victor Valley Off-Highway Vehicle Enforcement team assists nearby Sheriff's jurisdictions, such as Barstow and Morongo Valley at race events like "King of the Hammers." A portion of the "King of the Hammers" event is held in Victor Valley Station's jurisdiction on the western end of Johnson Valley Off-Highway Vehicle area. The main area in which the event is held falls in Morongo Basin's jurisdiction within Johnson Valley. However, the Victor Valley Station is responsible for the western half of the valley with the border starting at Rattlesnake Canyon Road northeast to Lafon Road then north to Padington Road, The boarder travels northeast through open desert where it intersects with Barstow Station's boarder then travels west to Highway 247. The "King of the Hammers" event draws 75,000 to 100,000 attendees and can dramatically impact operations at the Victor Valley Station. The Victor Valley OHV Team attends sporting events such as the SCTA vehicle time trials that occur at the El Mirage OHV/Dry Lake area. Working in partnership with the BLM, the Victor Valley OHV provides law enforcement and public safety services to attendees of these events.

The Victor Valley OHV Team uses both regular and reserve deputy sheriffs to conduct outreach programs to local OHV equipment vendors and local events such as "Phelan Phamily Phun Days." The purpose of this outreach is to provide information to the vendors, who in turn provide this to their customers. The information covers topics such as OHV laws and regulations, as well as the legal riding opportunities in San Bernardino County. Additionally, one of the deputies on the Victor Valley OHV Team is an ASI ATV and UTV/ORV safety instructor. This officer trains both deputies and search and rescue members on the safe operation of UTV's at enforcement and rescue operations.

The Victor Valley Station OHV team has established a strong partnership with B.L.M. and the U.S. Forest. During the grant process over the last several years the Victor Valley Station has had to eliminate new equipment purchases due to reduced funding. This has caused several pieces of equipment to require additional repairs or upgrades during this grant cycle. During this grant cycle the Victor Valley OHV Team would like to purchase the following items:

- 1. (2) four seat Law enforcement UTV outfitted with emergency lighting. This will allow officers to assist and transport stranded OHV enthusiasts in the remote OHV riding areas as well as safe transportation if there is an arrest.
- 2. (4) 4X4 Utility Quads to replace antiquated equipment currently being used in OHV patrol operations. This will allow officers to safely assist with patrol operations in OHV use areas.
- 3. (1) Laptop computers to be used for grant administration and operational planning using grant-funded mapping software
- 4. (4) Helmet communications devices for motorcycle and ATV patrol radio (800mhz).
- 5. Funding for four person intercom radio systems. With the law requiring all operators to wear helmets, officers are having difficulty hearing critical radio traffic during normal ROV driving operations. The intercom system will allow officers to respond more effectively and communicate freely. This system is different from the previously listed system.

6. Funds for ongoing, and as needed, repair and maintenance of equipment previously purchased with OHV grant funding. Much of the equipment is in need of repair and/or maintenance.

7. (2) Off road capable motorcycles to replace (2) of the (4) 10 year old bikes in the fleet.

ITEM 2. Project Coverage

The Victor Valley OHV Team is responsible for patrolling over 100,000 acres of land and greater than 400sq/miles of territory of legal riding areas within its jurisdiction. The areas range from desert landscape to mountain foothills. The Victor Valley Station is responsible for patrolling the Stoddard Valley and Johnson Valley open use areas as well as the Juniper Flats limited use areas. The Stoddard Valley open use area consists of 54,969 acres and plays host to an average of 12 permitted OHV events a year, including motorcycle, truck and UTV races. The Johnson Valley open use area consists of 43,431 acres of open access land use area, 56,000 acres of shared use area available to the public for a total of approximately 100,000 acres at this time and is the largest designated OHV area known to exist in the state of California. The area hosts an average of 15 permitted events throughout the year, including National Hare and Hound motorcycle series competitions and several District 37 riding events. The area hosts the "King of the Hammers" UTV, truck and motorcycle race annually. The "King of The Hammers" event can bring approximately 100,000 spectators to the Lucerne Valley area during the week-long event.

The Victor Valley Station assists the Barstow BLM office with patrols in the area of the El Mirage Dry Lake land use area. Deputies often conduct patrols during sanctioned SCTA events and holiday weekends. The Victor Valley Station conducts patrols within the community of El Mirage to locate stolen OHV equipment and prevent illegal entry into the legal riding areas, The Victor Valley Station also assists the BLM and U.S. Forest Service in the approximately 25,000 acres of Edwards Bowl which is located north of the El Mirage OHV area and the approximately 101,000 acres in the Juniper Flats limited use area located in Apple Valley.

The Juniper Flats sub-region is an area of public, private and state lands in the foothills of the San Bernardino Mountains. The Forest Service has plans to expand the existing OHV trail system located in several of the communities of the Victor Valley. The Victor Valley Station conducts routine patrols in communities located adjacent to the legal OHV areas locate throughout our station's jurisdiction. These patrols are conducted in the unincorporated areas of Phelan, Pinon Hills, Oak Hills, Hesperia, Apple Valley, Lucerne Valley, Helendale and El Mirage.

These communities have existing OHV trails systems currently being used by the public. Several subjects contacted during patrols are in non-legal riding areas attempting to gain illegal access to legal riding areas. As of August, 2016 several of the popular riding areas were closed as a result of the Pilot and Blue Cut fires. Both of the fires encroached the Victor Valley area and riding trails like the Baldy Mesa system have been closed. Enforcement efforts need to be increased in order for restoration of the areas to take effect.

ITEM 3. Describe the frequency of the patrols

The Victor Valley Station Off-Highway Vehicle Team hopes to field officers 2-6 times per month during the peak riding months of October through April throughout the above listed Off-Highway Vehicle areas. The majority of these assignments will be on the weekends; however, there will be patrol assignments in the middle of the week as needed. The Victor Valley Station Off-Highway Vehicle team will conduct special patrol operations during major holidays, including but not limited to, New Years, President's Day, Easter and Thanksgiving. The Victor Valley Station is attempting to obtain grant funding for the purchase of new equipment and upgrade or repair existing equipment so additional patrols can be conducted. The station must continue to train several new deputies in the safe operation on OHV equipment so they can assist with patrols throughout the Victor Valley jurisdiction. In 2016 the Victor Valley Station was able to train two additional deputies in the safe operation of grant-funded patrol motorcycles. The Victor Valley Station is hoping to train an additional four deputies for motorcycle patrols in 2017. The station would like to send four deputies to UTV/ATV training.

ITEM 4. Deployment of Personnel

When utilizing grant-funded motorcycles, approximately two to four deputies will be used, as well as one support vehicle. When deputies are utilizing grant-funded Jeeps and UTV's, a minimum of four deputies and one supervisor are needed. The Victor Valley Station will also utilize volunteers from Citizens on Patrol, Search and Rescue and Reserve Deputy units

to conduct OHV patrols and community outreach programs during this grant cycle.

Depending on the type and size of the event, up to 10 deputies could be utilized daily during the event. Some events last several days and law enforcement presence must be maintained during the entire event. During the past several grant periods funding has been reduced. The Victor Valley Station has eliminated the purchase of new patrol equipment and the upgrading of existing grant-funded patrol equipment and command post.

The Victor Valley Station is seeking new grant funding for the purchase of new patrol equipment and repairs and up keep of previously purchased equipment. New equipment will allow the station to conduct even more effective patrols within its jurisdiction. The expanded patrols will also be conducted in the areas of surrounding agencies such as BLM and National Forest Service Area.

 - The Victor Valley Off-Highway Vehicle Enforcement Team (VVOHVT) utilizes grant funds to provide law enforcement services, public outreach and educational opportunities to visitors and OHV enthusiasts in the High Desert area of San Bernardino County. Deputies assigned to the team contact the public and handout maps and information related to OHV laws and legal riding areas within our jurisdiction. While not always the primary purpose for the team, deputies also contact violators and issue citation violations of State OHV and traffic laws as well as county ordinances related to habitat and property encroachment. By educating the public and enforcing applicable laws, the VVOHVT supports safe and responsible riding in its jurisdiction.
- 3. Describe the Applicant's formal or informal cooperation with other law enforcement agencies:

4. Does the Applicant recover a portion of the law enforcement costs directly associated

with privately sponsored OHV events where sponsors have obtained a local permit?

The VVOHVT works on a regular basis with the Bureau of Land Management (Barstow Field Office), US Forest Service and the County of San Bernardino Code Enforcement (OHV Division). The VVOHVT routinely works at desert races and events with the BLM Barstow Field Office. In addition to the BLM, the VVOHVT works with the US Forest Service to address details such as habitat encroachment and illegal land intrusion in areas such as the Pacific Coast Trail, San Bernardino and Los Angeles National Forest area.

Permitted events including off-road racing and concert style gatherings are patrolled extensively at the expense of
the Victor Valley OHV program. The Victor Valley Station assigned multiple deputies to quads, UtV's, Motorcycles
and Jeeps, which are funded by the OHV grant prgram to these events. These patrol functions are critical to the
safety of both event participants and spectators.

- 6. Describe the Applicant's OHV law enforcement training program including how the training program educates personnel to address OHV safety and natural and cultural resource protection:
 - All Victor Valley Station OHV team personnel have been trained and certified by a qualified ATV instructor. Currently the Victor Valley Station has four deputies who have completed a 40-hour course in the safe operation of Dual Sport Motorcycles. The course was hosted by the San Bernardino County Emergency Vehicle Operations Center. The Victor Valley Station hopes to send 4 additional deputies to this course during the 2016/17 grant cycle. The Victor Valley Station recognizes the importance of enforcing the law and educating the enthusiasts about the law. We also recognize the principals of "Letter of the Law" -vs- "Spirit of the Law". Our number one priority is to ensure the public safety and maintain a good relationship with OHV community in our patrol areas. The VVOHVT supports and distributes literature related to the "Tread Lightly" philosophy, as well as parental
